SASKIA COOLEN studied at the Sweelinck Conservatory in Amsterdam with Kees Boeke and Walter de Hauwe. She teaches the course "Diminutions and Ornamentation" at the Royal Conservatory in The Hague and the Utrecht Conservatory. She is a member with the Brisk Recorder Quartet and La Fontegara Amsterdam and has numerous recordings with both ensembles. She was a teacher for many years at the conservatories of Hilversum and Amsterdam and gives numerous master classes and courses all over the world, especially in the United States.

TOM ZAJAC is a multi-instrumentalist widely praised for his

versatility and stylish playing. Tom is a member of Piffaro: the Renaissance Band, and the musical/ theatrical group Ex Umbris. He's a regular guest artist with the Folger Consort of Washington, DC, and has also appeared with numerous other US early music ensembles. Tom can be heard on over 30 recordings, ranging from Medieval dances and baroque opera, to contemporary folk-rock. The sound of his bagpipe awoke the astronauts every



morning on an early space shuttle mission. Tom teaches at recorder and early music workshops throughout the US and is on the faculty of the Wellesley College.





Springfels had devoted herself to performance and teaching of early music repertoires. She earned her stripes performing with many influential pioneering ensembles, including New York Pro Musica, the Elizabethan Enterprise, concert Royal, and the Waverly consort. For 20 years she directed the innovative Newberry Consort, and can be heard on dozens of recordings. In 2006, Mary moved to the mountains of New Mexico, where she is active in the formation of

an intentional community called the Wit's End Coop. She continues to teach and perform extensively. Most recently, she has taught at the San Francisco Early Music Society, The Viola da Gamba Society of America, Amherst Early Music, and the Pinewoods Early Music Week.

ROBERT WIEMKEN After starting a career as a brass play-



er, Bob Wiemken has had a long love affair with early double-reed instruments; including, above all, making reeds for shawms, dulcians and more. As Artistic Co-Director of Piffaro: The Renaissance Band, he has performed worldwide, recorded extensively, and built over 100 programs of Renaissance and early Baroque music. He is a wellappreciated teacher in college and university settings. and teaches regularly at festivals and

workshops throughout the country. Currently, in addition to his performing, researching, recording and educating responsibilities, he continues to plumb the depths of early reed technique.

PETER MAUND A founding member of Ensemble Alcatraz and

Alasdair Fraser's Skyedance, Peter Maund has performed with early and contemporary music ensembles including Anonymous 4, Chanticleer, El Mundo, and many others. He has been a featured performer and clinician at festivals throughout Europe, the Americas, and in the Middle East. Maund is the author of "Percussion" in A Performers Guide to Medieval Music, Indiana University Press, 2000. Described by the Glasgow

Herald as "the most considerate and imaginative of percussionists," Peter Maund can be heard on over 50 recordings.

BECKY BAXTER Ms. Baxter's resume as a professional in the



field of early harp includes performances of harp literature from the 12th through 18th centuries on a wide variety of historical harps. Becky has performed at events such as: the National Harp Society Convention, Houston Grand Opera's productions of Monteverdi's L'Orfeo and L'Incoronazione di Poppea (including subsequent broadcasts on NPR), the Boston Early Music Festival, the Round Top Early Music Festival, the Amherst Early Music

Festival, and the Historical Harp Society Conference/Workshops. Two of her recordings went up in the shuttle with astronaut Bill McArthur in Fall of 2000.
